Christmas Ornaments by Kurt Hertzog - March Demonstration



The evening demonstration on Christmas ornaments with Kurt was both interesting and informative The theme of the evening focused on creativity rather than actual woodturning. This was

achieved with the presentation of many different ideas and concepts and their subsequent intermixing while looking at all aspects of the ornament.

Through the use of different mediums from wood to eggshells and seashells combined with different techniques to use on the mediums, Kurt was able to demonstrate many possibilities for creating a wide variety of ornaments.

We were first introduced to different ideas and materials that could be used for hanging the ornaments. A light weight monofilament fishing line tended to make the hanger disappear whereas a heavier braided and more colorful string could



be used to accent the ornament.

We were then taken to the technique of piercing which was used on the hollow wood forms, with em-



phasis on the necessity for a thin uniform wall thickness. The piercing was also demonstrated to be used very successfully on eggshells. The seashells used incorporated their own unique decorative effect

We were then shown ideas for protecting these very fragile ornaments. These ranged from the use of a small dowel to separate



the finial and the top, to two piece finials which protected the ornament from damage due to compression and twisting.

The evening then concluded with a demonstration on techniques for turning long and very thin finials, using your fingers as a steady rest support.

I am sure that we all were able to pick up some tips and ideas to incorporate into our own wood turning.

The Don Geiger demo program is entitled: "Mastering the Side-Ground Bowl Gouge". It starts with sharpening of the bowl gouge with emphasis on shape, function and repeatability. He will also demonstrate how to sharpen a gouge with a steep primary micro-bevel and a secondary relief bevel and how to do it very repeatedly. Once the sharpening is completed, he will demonstrate five specific uses of a side-ground bowl gouge, plus the usage of the steeper micro-beveled gouge. The demonstration of how to use the gouges includes a comprehensive lesson on turning a natural edged bowl, starting with the selection and cutting of a bowl blank, several mounting options and re-centering techniques. Jam and vacuum chucking will be demonstrated too. Don will perform his demo program on his 900 lb. Stubby lathe.

Finishing Secrets (V. 1) with Russ Fairfield VHS tape #1208 (approx. 2 hours

Russ Fairfield on the first of a 3 tape set covers finishing and preparing the surface for the 'finish' which is to be applied when you have arrived at a surface that is as close to perfect as you can get. He starts with the three secrets to a good finish, and moving on through his five secrets of sanding. Russ works through the selection and cleaning of sandpaper, explaining grits and types available. He also leads us through centering the project in the chuck, and finishing wax.

Russ works through hand sanding, his way, followed by power sanding, and finishing off with the finer grits. This includes completing the platter with a brown paper grocery bag! A natural edged bowl is stepped through, with all the problems for sanding that this shape causes. Lathe speeds appear on the screen throughout, with cutting and shaping your own sandpaper demonstrated. Ensuring adequate dust collection, and selecting a regular drill, angle drill or an air drill is covered. The tape concludes with filling voids, cracks and knots and using the buffer as both a final surface preparation, and also as a finish.

Russ Fairfield has all the necessary steps to improve your finishing techniques covered, starting with this video.
