

Maynard is also a busy volunteer with Habitat for Humanities, involved with recycling material and equipment from old buildings. These materials are then used for remodeling or sold for cash toward new buildings.

Although this will be his first experience at demonstrating, he is looking forward to the challenge and to meeting such a large group of fellow woodturners and sharing ideas.

BOOK REVIEW

The focus for this month's book review is the monthly periodical, "More Woodturning." This is published by Fred Holder, an experienced turner who's enthusiasm assures the reader a solid foundation for the nuts and bolts of woodturning. In addition to the technical side of the paper, he also investigates the issues pertaining more to the "artistic" side of woodturning.

All three of the monthly issues that I reviewed were chock full of timely and helpful advice for turners of all levels. The content ranges from an easy to follow tutorial on hand chasing threads, to using the Sorby Texturing tool for applying (you guessed it) texture to your work.

There is a general theme to each issue and I found all of the samples to be equally as interesting and readable from cover to cover. In addition to several articles, each issue will typically contain comprehensive book and tool reviews, News in the Trade, Questions and Answers, Ask Fred, and a variety of other turning related topics.

I very much enjoyed reading More Woodturning, and believe that it would make a welcome addition to any turners library regardless of their individual level of experience. My only area of concern is with the newsprint that it is printed on. While the paper may keep the price reasonable, it also limits the definition of the photography. And more importantly, I have to wonder how it will hold up over time, especially since More Woodturning is one of those references that you are likely to return to time and again.

"HAVE IT YOUR WAY" WOODTURNING COMPETITION

As I mentioned in an earlier newsletter, the Guild would like to have a woodturning competition in the fall. All those who enter would be given a wood blank measuring either 3" x 3" x 12" or 3" x 6" x 6", your choice. All pieces would be of the same species, we are looking at using hard maple, soft maple or ash and kiln dried. The exact species hasn't been decided yet, we are still talking to suppliers.

From there on you're on your own. Use your creative instincts and imagination and make whatever you want out of it. You can slice it up, glue it, dye it, paint it, your choice, the only real rule is that in the final analysis, it must be turned, after all we are woodturners.

Since some turners enjoy the challenge of making something with only the blank supplied them, while others would prefer to add something to it such as knobs, veneer, rings etc, we have come up with two categories. The first is for purists; the finished item must not have anything added to it except glue and finish (which could be a clear finish, dye, paint etc.). The second category is for those who like variety, the piece could contain up to 20% of the original volume added to it in the form of metal, veneer, additional wood etc. One could start a long argument as to which category would be more difficult.

The pieces will be separated into 8 groups for judging, 4 for the purists and 4 for variety, each having classes for Novice, Intermediate, Advanced and Master. You decide which class you want to enter, but remember, if you have won in a competition before, you must move up a class.

Prizes will be given for the best piece in each of the eight groups and well as one for the most creative and another for the best use of material.

Judging will take place at the October 21 meeting with 3 judges. **Do not** identify the piece with your name on the bottom, you can do that after you take it home again. The judges will critique the winning entries after the competition. The entry must be brought to the October 21 meeting by 7:30 so the judging can take place.

To enter, fill in the entry form in this newsletter or pick one up at the April 15 or May 20 general meeting. Get the entry form to me (Frank Ditomaso) at one of the meetings. The wood blanks will be handed out at the June 17 meeting. We need to have the entry forms in at the May 20 meeting at the latest so we know how much wood to order. The entry fee is \$10 which must accompany the entry form. The entry fee will pay for the wood and leave us a little extra to buy prizes.


You will have all summer to convert your humble blank of wood into something really special. I think with over 100 members we will have over 100 unique and interesting entries.

Go for it and have fun.



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
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The Marketplace
