To nurse himself along in the meantime, he has just announced the arrival of a bouncing baby (wait for it) Carbotech which he has named Variablespeed..

If you thought that Josh Pichanick was looking somewhat fatter lately, you were correct.

He found out from Brian McIntosh that a USA Turning Supply Company had two British made Poolewood lathes at the AAW show.

A quick phone call revealed that one machine was available as a demonstration model, at a very good price and did I want it?.

After a very short pregnant pause, Josh imagined the ecstasy of having a new addition at his age, and blushingly said "I do".

As the stork was real tuckered out by then (Southern talk), he and his son drove full term South, to North Carolina (eh!), and returned home, with the Taurus wagon looking eight months overdue, and a new addition to the family which weighed in at about 440lb.

It's name is 38:40 Prestige. His modified Delta will shortly be put up for adoption.

Can't help but wonder what else went on behind closed (garage and basement) doors. Imagine what

could happen if we met for two months and broke for 10 months? Don't be shy, tell us about your new arrival.

THE POOLEWOOD, for our member's information, was designed as a "turners lathe" by the well known turner Nigel Voisy, and is only sold direct by Poolewood, in England, which explains why it is not well known here.

The Prestige 38:40 has a rated capacity of 38 inch diameter with the swivel head at 90 degrees to the bed, 14 inch over the bed, and 24 inch inboard when the bed bars are repositioned to create a Gap Bed feature.

It has 62mm. heavy duty, adjustable, taper roller bearings, rated to handle at least four times the dynamic loading of similar size ball bearings and are capable of coping with rotational forces in excess of 5 tons.

It has mechanical variable speed, from 270 rpm to about 3000 rpm, and certainly warrants closer inspection by serious turners, being very competitively priced, and with many excellent features..

As the whole assembly, including the sandfilled bench weighs about 800 lbs., I won't be transporting it around. But, for anyone interested, I would be happy to demonstrate the lathe and provide engineering and pricing information.

TURNERS TIPS

From Stuart Bootsma-----
To "drill" a centre hole in a lathe mounted bowl blank without the use of the tailstock, produce a small centre point in the normal way. Then move the toolrest away, and with a DEEP FLUTED SPINDLE GOUGE.(NOT A BOWL GOUGE) simply push it in to the required depth. It's that fast, and straight every time.

From Brian McIntosh----
who noted that most bowl turners at the AAW Symposium used a three inch Powerlock sanding disc on a two inch Powerlock pad, which was very effective in reaching "tight" areas and curves. While at the Turners supply store in North Carolina, I discovered that Powerlock have a three inch disc, with a half inch wide reinforced edge on the pad side, called a Flex Pad. Does anyone know where they are available and the cost?. Many of you have your own turning ideas. Please share them with your fellow members, no matter how simple (the ideas, that is.)
