PAUL ROSS of CHALET WOODCRAFT treated us to a superb demonstration, which included something for everyone.

His first piece, turned on our Wadkin, was a shallow bowl with a burnt rim.

Using a propane torch, he burnt the rim and then polished it with black shoe polish.

The effect was stunning as it added a new artistic dimension to the piece and was much more effective than outright deep scorching or charring.

Next, on his Carbotech lathe, Paul turned a small, attractive natural -edge container into which he fitted the bottle of a fuel burning lamp. After reverse chucking the container onto a spigot (with the aid of a tissue) he turned the bottom and applied a finish of Melamine and paste wax. A great idea for Christmas gifts.

The last project was a key chain fob, turned from Snakewood.

This is a spectacular wood species, but even more spectacular was Paul's mastery of the 'dreaded' skew chisel, which for me does just that, cuts skew--very.

The true measure of an excellent turner / teacher / demonstrator is the ability to perform high-tech turning techniques on a low key basis, and still appeal to the entire cross section of his audience, from beginner to advanced to professional.

This Paul Ross did and a sincere thank you from all of us in the GHWG.

Since the October issue of the CHIP FLYER, we have learnt that Loyal Leidens also won a first and second at the Woodstock show, in the furniture category, and Michael Hitchcox had an interesting article published in the October issue of The Canadian Workshop magazine.

Josh Pichanick had a surprise phone call from a woodturner in Toronto, who said he had

chanced upon an excellent (he said) half hour presentation on a Rogers Cable Community Channel.

The taped show featured a very talented turner (he said), who is the typical, unknown, starving artist type (Josh said).

Yes, it was me. Josh, (sitting in for our Editor, Kevin Ellis), and the tape had been shot in my garage shop!, by a Niagara based community channel, for the St. Catharines Craft Guild of which I am a member.

I had forgotten all about it, but I will try to obtain a copy for our library. R.R. eat your heart out!

SHOW AND TELL

Was more proof of the talent within our Guild.

Sandy Graham and Doug Newlove, both Show prize winners, explained their fabulous winning pieces.

There were excellent examples of bud vases, platters, small vases, and a bird house, which were described by two relatively new woodturners, Guy Mechan and Cliff Rose. Pieces do not have to be big to be good.

Eugen Schlaak showed the custom made tools he uses to do the inside of hollow turnings, and also some of the pieces he used them on.

Brian Crossthwaite explained his ingenious home made jig which he uses to turn laminated napkin rings.

And Josh Pichanick showed a new type of caliper, available from Lee Valley Tools, used to measure wall thickness on hollow turnings or large diameter bowls.

He also explained the use of 10 oz. truck wheel weights to compensate for severely out of round or unbalanced blanks, when mounted on the lathe. Do you recall the resin blank which David Loewy poured for the GHWG at his September presentation. Unfortunately, when it was placed in the upstairs storeroom, it was not lying level and the resin cured very thin at the low end.

However, undaunted by this and a couple other problems, our Second VP, Doug Newlove volunteered (u-hum), to take it home and turn it. Doug returned the piece, which he had finished to perfection. Together with the artistic stand he made, it will make a very attractive special Christmas Draw Prize at the December 12th. meeting.

ELECTION of the new EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE
Al McBurney (our master movie man), as chairman of the Nomination Committee, briefly explained the procedure and the nomination forms and will expand on this most important subject again. From a shaky beginning in January 96, when the

steering / executive committee didn't know if there would even be enough members to pay the rent etc., we now have 66 dedicated members.
